




Incident Response Summary




Incident Percentage




Response by Engine

Swift Water Rescue Training

- The Division provided quarterly Training Packets to the Operations Division which included specific topics in four (4) general training categories:
 - Fire
 - Medical
 - Rescue
 - Other
- Operational Members included Firefighters (48), Fire Captains (19), Apprentice Firefighters (12) and Chief Officers (7) for an authorized strength of 86 personnel.


Note: Minimum daily Staffing of 27 members.

• Also included in the report are Volunteer Firefighters (21) and 4 Fire Explorers.

- Training is provided daily at the Company level and is administered by the Captain using the Quarterly Training Packets as a guide.
- Completed training is documented in the Firehouse computer program and all data furnished in this report comes from that source.
- Topics assigned are based on mandates, laws, requirements, agency recognized needs and best industry practices.
- Outside Training Courses are also utilized by individuals and in some cases reimbursed by the District per MOU provisions.
- Eight (8) Recruit Firefighters were also hired to fill vacancies and individual recruits attended two formal Fire Academies
