#### **Training Division 2012**

- The Division provided Eight (8) six week Training Modules to the Operations Division which included specific topics in four (4) general training categories:
  - Fire
  - Medical
  - Rescue
  - Other
- Operational Members included Firefighters (45), Fire Captains (18), Apprentice Firefighters (12) and Chief Officers (4) for an authorized strength of 76 personnel.

Note: Minimum daily Staffing of 26 members.

 Also included in the report are Volunteer Firefighters (15) and 4 Fire Explorers.


#### Training Division 2012

- Training is provided daily at the Company level and is administered by the Captain using the Training Module Packets as a guide.
- Completed training is documented in the Firehouse computer program and all data furnished in this report comes from that source.
- Topics assigned are based on mandates, laws, requirements, agency recognized needs and best industry practices.
- Outside Training Courses are also utilized by individuals and in some cases reimbursed by the District per MOU provisions.
- Four (4) Recruit Firefighters completed formal probationary requirements during 2012.






