WHEREAS, on November 21, 2024, pursuant to California Government Code section 56853, the Boards of Directors of El Dorado County Fire Protection District (“ECF”) and the Diamond Springs/El Dorado Fire Protection District (“DSP”) (hereinafter collectively referred to as “the Parties”), unanimously adopted joint Resolutions of Application 2024-10 and 2024-05 , respectively, to jointly request and initiate proceedings pursuant to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, commencing with section 56000 of the California Government Code (“Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act”), with the Local Agency Formation Commission of the County of El Dorado (“El Dorado County LAFCO”), consisting of the concurrent dissolution of DSP and annexation of the DSP service area and sphere of influence into a reorganized ECF; and

WHEREAS, on May 16, 2025, pursuant to the Parties’ joint Resolutions of Application, the Parties submitted a complete application for reorganization of the El Dorado County Fire Protection District ECF to El Dorado County LAFCO; and

WHEREAS, on January 28, 2026, El Dorado County LAFCO adopted El Dorado County LAFCO Resolution L-2026-02, approving the Parties’ joint petition and application for reorganization of the El Dorado County Fire Protection District ECF, which included several executory provisions to be taken by the Board of Directors of the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District; and

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2026, El Dorado County LAFCO adopted El Dorado County LAFCO Resolution L-2026-07, finding insufficient protest, and confirming and ordering without an election the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District; and

WHEREAS, on April 24, 2026, El Dorado County LAFCO recorded a Certificate of Completion with the El Dorado County Recorder, pursuant to California Government Code section 57202, which officially established the effective date of the reorganization of the El Dorado County Fire Protection District ECF; and

WHEREAS, at its initial meeting on April 16, 2026, the Board of Directors of the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District identified the need to take several executory steps to implement the reorganization authorized by El Dorado County LAFCO.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District is hereby established pursuant to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act and El Dorado County LAFCO Resolutions L-2026-02 and L-2026-07.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that, based on the Parties' Joint Resolution 2025-17, as approved by El Dorado County LAFCO in El Dorado County LAFCO Resolutions L-2026-02 and L-2026-07, the Board of Directors of the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District, the Division of the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District they represent, and their terms are as follows:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District approves and adopts El Dorado County LAFCO Resolutions L-2026-02 and L-2026-07, including the findings and determinations therein, forming the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the reorganized El Dorado County Fire Protection District accepts the transfer to the reorganized District of all assets and liabilities of the Parties, as authorized in El Dorado County LAFCO Resolutions L-2026-02 and L-2026-07.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the El Dorado County Fire Protection District delegates authority to the Chair of the Board of Directors and the District Fire Chief to execute necessary documents to complete the transfer of assets and liabilities to the District, and other actions to complete the implementation of the reorganization.

Subject: Station 28 stucco project

Overview:

Station 28 currently houses a staffed engine company with three personnel and a medic unit with two Paramedic Ambulance Operators as well as cross staffing Truck 28 and Water-Tender 28. The station also houses a type-3 engine available for strike team assignments for in-county or out-of-county requests.

Last year, the stucco on the south side of the facility showed signs of buckling in several areas as well as outright failure in others resulting in large chunks of stucco falling off. The repair project was performed by Heath Construction after a formal bid process in which Heath Construction was significantly less expensive than the only other contractor who submitted a formal bid. County Fire was impressed with the efficiency and quality of the repair.

While performing the initial repair, observation of an additional area requiring repair was identified as being a priority but necessarily put on hold due to seasonal weather conditions. The damaged area is approximately 1,080 square feet of material. Heath construction was re-contacted for an evaluation and bid for repair recently, and has submitted a bid for the work, which was received 2-26-26.

Proposal:

Approve the contract for the bid from Heath Construction to begin work as soon as possible in its entirety. This consists of removal of the damaged stucco and plywood sheathing, replacement of the insulation and sheathing and replacement of the multiple layers of stucco complete with paint and damaged material disposal.

Cost:

\$50,000.00

Subject: Station 19 Bay project

Overview:

Station 19 currently houses a full crew of five personnel staffing an engine, medic unit and cross staffing a water tender. The facility is a metal structure with a full living quarters attached to an engine bay covered by a single roof. Recently, the living quarters was damaged from a water leak and underwent a remodel of the kitchen, sleeping quarters and one of the two bathrooms – living quarters is in good repair and areas remodeled are in excellent shape. Additionally, the motors on the three bay doors were recently replaced due to necessity.

The bays, however, are in need of attention in several respects. The insulation on the ceiling of the bays is showing a significant amount of age and disrepair – in some cases, falling down onto the apparatus and is unsightly as well as ineffective for its purpose. Additionally, the lighting and shore line supply in the bays is in need of repair due to wiring problems and light fixture replacement needs. Also, the sprayed form of insulation on the steel beams/purlins and upright structural members in the bays is flaking off and is unsightly due to age and years of grime accumulation. This material has been tested and the results concluded that it is not dangerous to life/health.

Proposal:

In order to address the concerns previously mentioned with the bays, the Facilities division of County Fire has requested bids for the following services:

- Provide 'cap-sheeting' – a product used in industrial spaces to capture the sagging insulation that attaches to the underside of the structural members serving two purposes – keeping the insulation in place, and providing a visually appealing, professional look to the space
- Addressing the wiring in the bays and redoing portions that require replacement/repair as well as replacing the broken lighting fixtures. Also,

replacing the outward facing lighting that attach to the exterior of the structure onto the apron; this has not been functional for some time.

Cost:

In order to address the complexity of the wiring situation and provide the needed repairs, Carnahan Electric (the District's vendor) has provided a bid for the work totaling **\$8,500.00**

In order to address the failing insulation with cap-sheeting as well as remove large portions of the sprayed insulation, the District was able to collect two bids for the work – the preferred bid was not only less expensive, but crews have a higher degree of confidence in the contractor for the scope of work. Total cost of cap sheeting project **\$31,000.00**

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors Establish the following Standing Committees:

- Human Resources Committee
- Finance Committee
- Legislative Committee

Adopt the attached recommendation defining:

- The distinction between standing committees and ad hoc committees
- The scope, authority, and limitations of each committee type
- Brown Act compliance requirements applicable to committees
- Authorize the Board Chair to appoint committee members consistent with this recommendation.

BACKGROUND:

Committees are an important governance tool that allows the Board to efficiently review issues, develop recommendations, and provide focused oversight in key functional areas.

However, committees must be structured carefully to comply with the Brown Act, which governs open meetings for legislative bodies in California. Improperly formed or used committees can inadvertently trigger public noticing, agenda, and access requirements. Committees shall not be used to circumvent the requirements of the Brown Act, including through serial meetings, intermediary communications, or delegation of decision-making authority. All final policy decisions, positions, and actions remain solely within the authority of the full Board of Directors.

This recommendation provides clarity on:

- When committees are subject to the Brown Act
- What authority committees may exercise
- How committees report back to the full Board

DISCUSSION:

1.Types of Committees:

Standing Committees:

A Standing Committee is a permanent committee established by formal Board action with continuing subject matter jurisdiction (e.g., finance, human resources, legislative affairs).

Brown Act Implications:

Standing committees are subject to the Brown Act if they:

- Have continuing jurisdiction
- Standing committees with continuing subject matter jurisdiction are legislative bodies under the Brown Act and are subject to all open meeting requirements, regardless of their size or composition
- Even when composed of less than a quorum, standing committees are generally treated as legislative bodies due to their ongoing jurisdiction.

Key Requirements:

- Public notice and posted agendas
- Meetings open to the public
- Public comment permitted
- Meeting minutes or records maintained

Ad Hoc Committees:

An Ad Hoc Committee is a temporary committee created for a specific, limited purpose and dissolved automatically once that purpose is completed.

To remain exempt from the Brown Act, an ad hoc committee must:

- Must be composed of fewer than a quorum of the Board
- Be formed for a single, clearly defined task
- Have a limited duration
- Ad hoc committees shall automatically dissolve upon completion of their assigned task without further Board action

If any of these conditions are not met, the committee may be treated as a standing committee and become subject to the Brown Act.

2. Limitations on Committee Authority

All committees, regardless of type:

- Serve in an advisory capacity only
- May not take final action or bind the Board
- Must bring recommendations to the full Board for consideration and action

Committees shall not:

- Direct staff independently (unless explicitly authorized)
- Commit agency resources
- Establish policy outside Board approval

3.Recommended Standing Committees

Human Resources (HR) Committee:

Provide oversight and recommendations related to personnel policies and organizational structure.

Scope:

- Review personnel policies and procedures
- Evaluate executive leadership (as applicable)
- Review compensation and benefits frameworks
- Provide input on organizational development

Limitations:

No authority to hire, fire, or discipline employees (unless explicitly delegated)
All final HR actions require Board approval

Finance Committee:

Provide financial oversight and ensure fiscal accountability.

Scope:

- Review of budgets and financial statements
- Monitor revenues, expenditures, and reserves
- Review audits and financial controls
- Make recommendations on financial policies

Limitations:

No authority to approve budgets or expenditures independently
All financial decisions require Board approval

Legislative Committee:

Monitor and advise on legislative and regulatory matters affecting the agency.

Scope:

- Review proposed legislation and policy developments
- Recommend advocacy positions
- Coordinate with staff on legislative strategy

Limitations:

Committee members shall not:

- Engage in lobbying activities on behalf of the agency without prior authorization by formal action of the full Board in a public meeting.
- Represent personal, political, or district-specific positions as official positions of the agency
- Solicit or promote political affiliation, endorsements, or support in a manner that implies Board approval
- Use their role on the Committee to advance personal, professional, or district interests without full Board authorization

All legislative positions, advocacy efforts, and external communications representing the agency must be:

- Reviewed and approved by the full Board in a public meeting, or
- Conducted pursuant to a formally adopted Board-approved legislative platform or policy

Failure to adhere to these limitations may result in removal from the Committee by the Board

Ad Hoc Committee

The Board may establish ad hoc committees as needed, subject to the following parameters:

- Must be created by Board action or direction
- Must have a clearly defined purpose, such as:
 - Executive recruitment
 - Strategic planning
 - Policy development
 - Must be composed of fewer than a quorum of the Board
 - Must automatically dissolve upon completion of the assigned task

Staff will track and confirm dissolution to ensure compliance.

4. Brown Act Compliance Safeguards

To ensure compliance

- Standing committees will:
- Post agendas in advance
- Allow public attendance and comment
- Maintain records of meetings

Ad hoc committees will:

- Be carefully scoped to remain exempt
- Avoid ongoing or undefined assignments
- Not expanding membership beyond a quorum
- Board members will:
- Avoid “serial meetings” or communications that could violate open meeting Laws

5. Fiscal Impact

Minimal. Staff will be required to support committee meetings, prepare agendas, and ensure compliance with public noticing requirements.

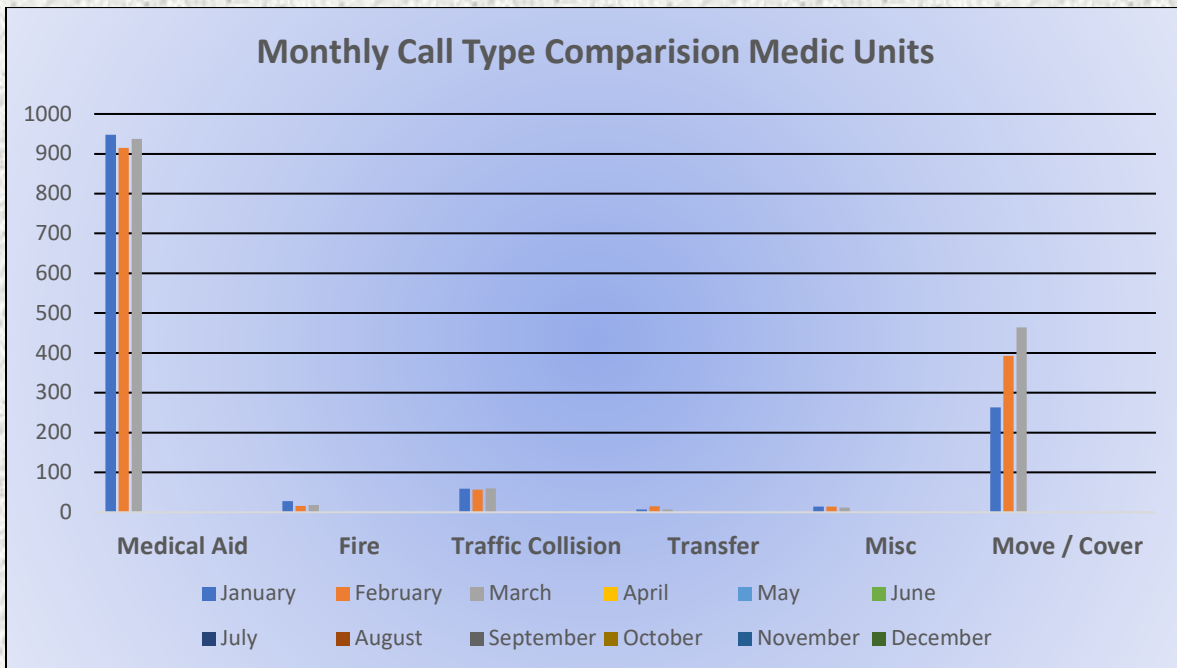
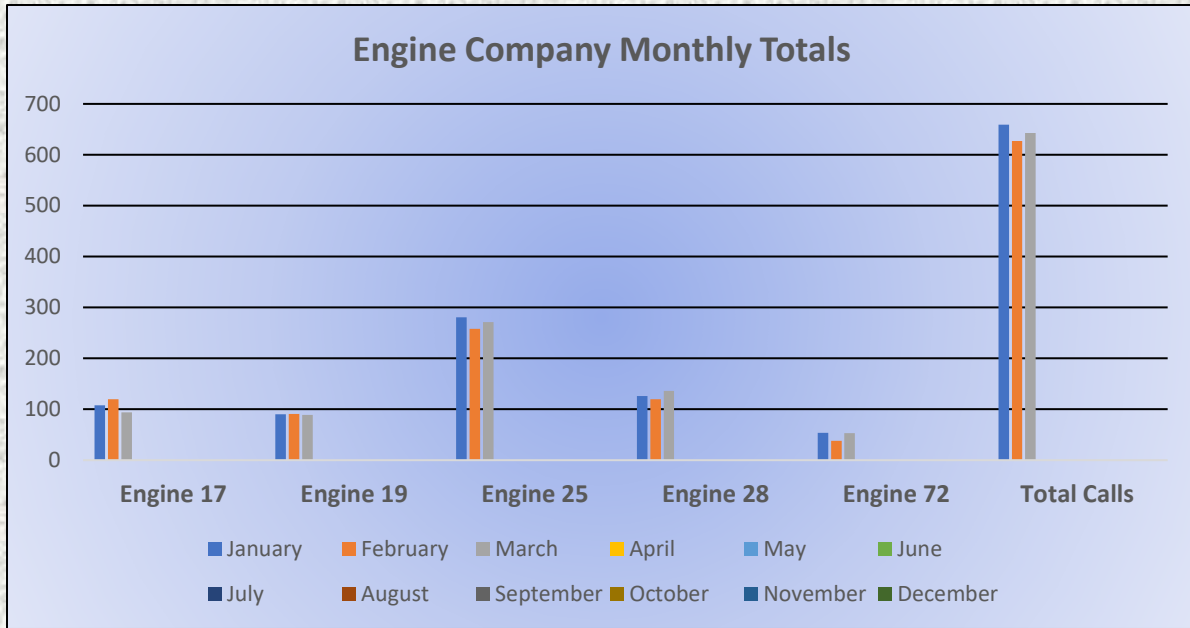

Monthly Run Statistics and Yearly Comparison March 2026 Engine Companies and Medic Units

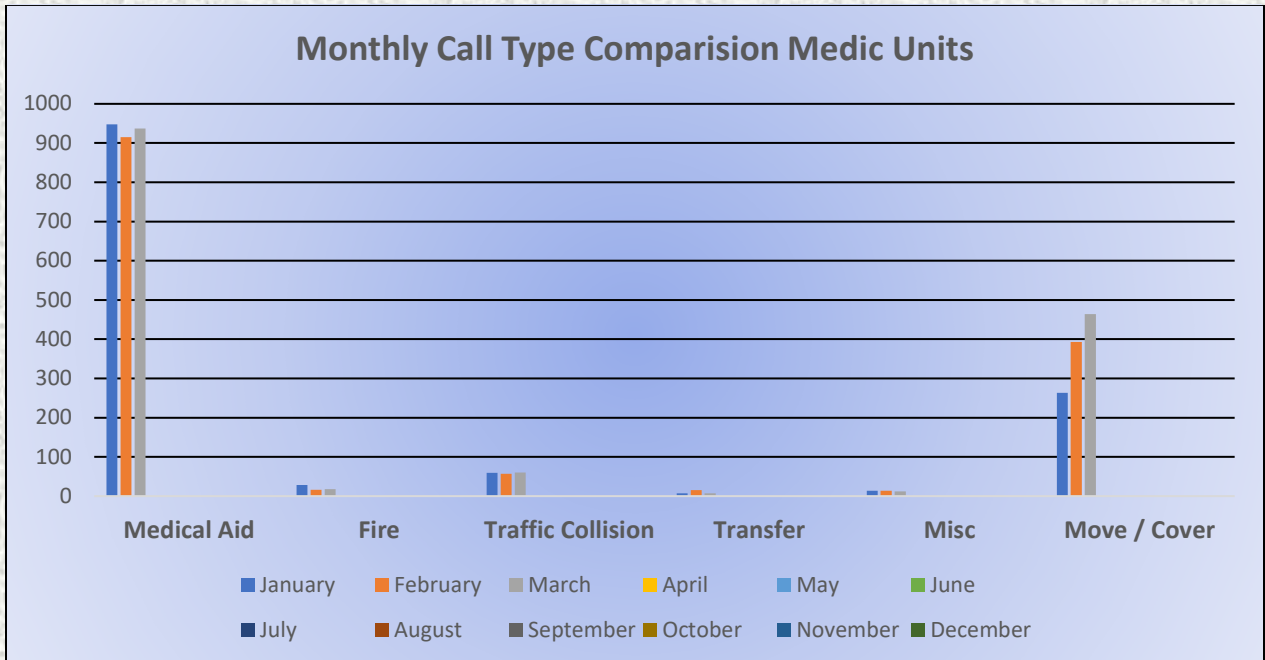
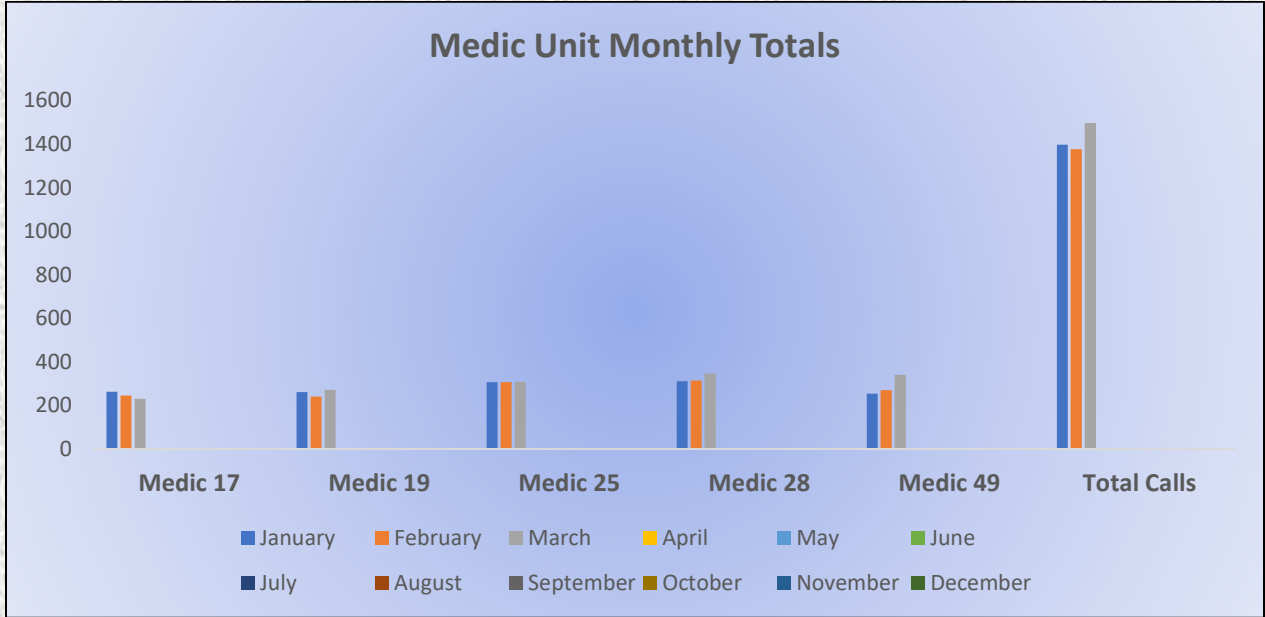

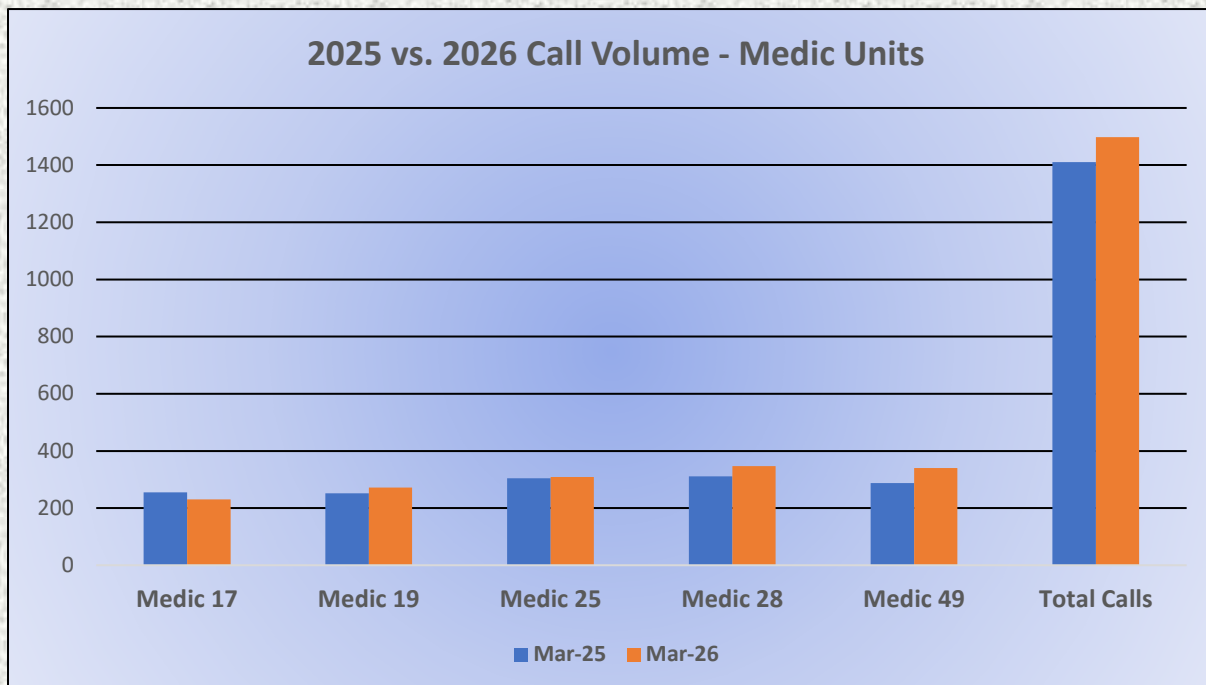
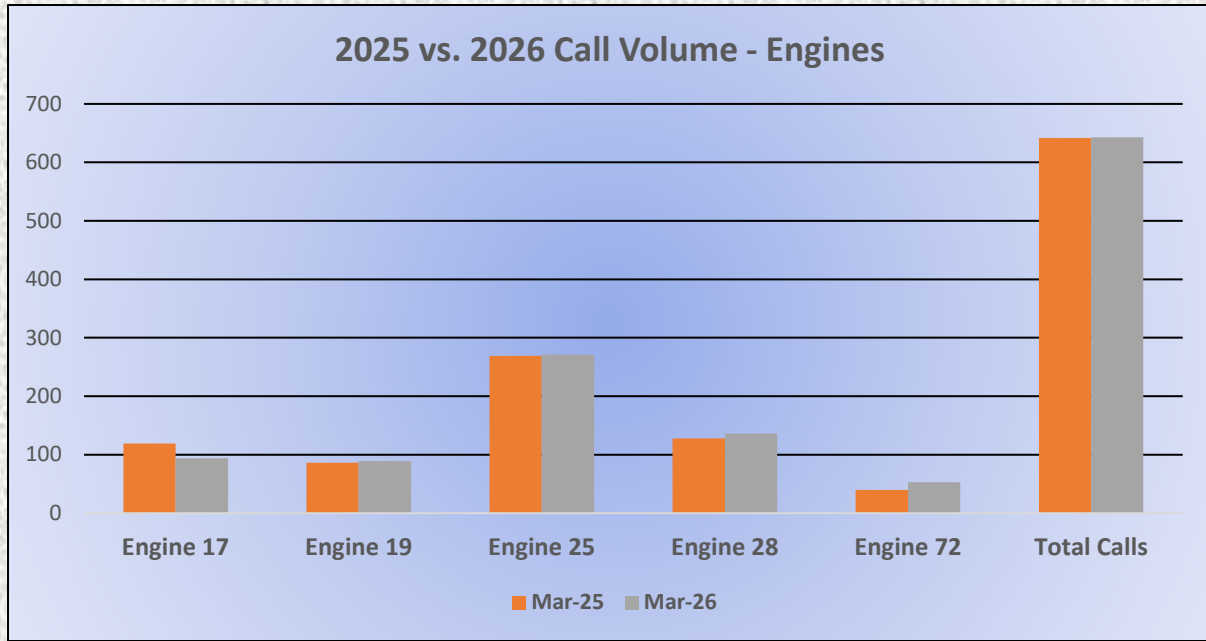

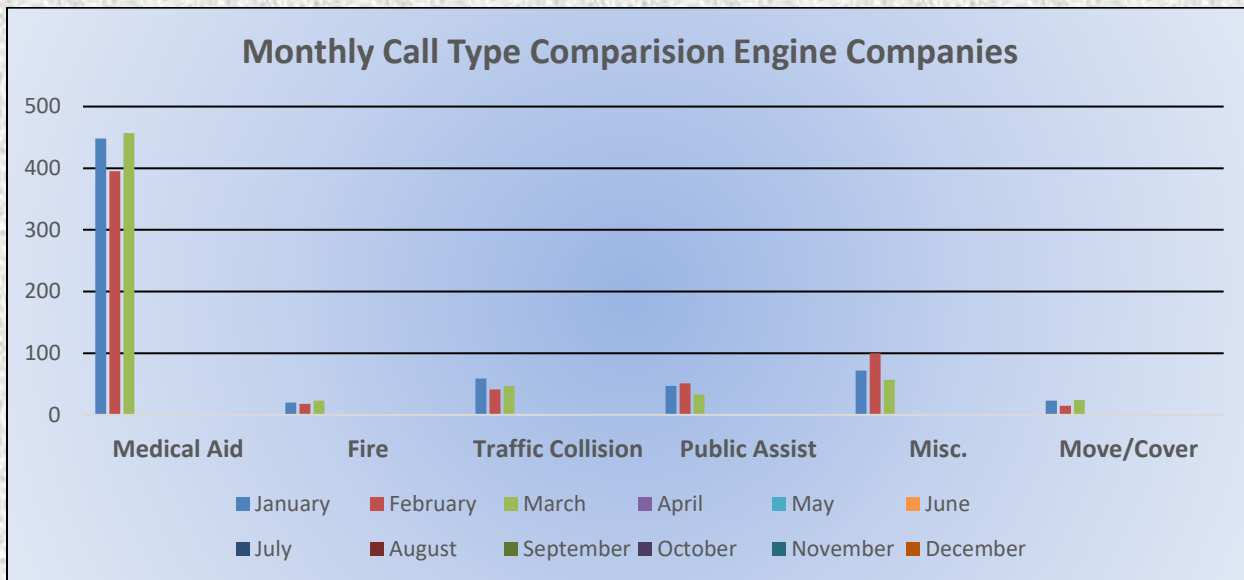
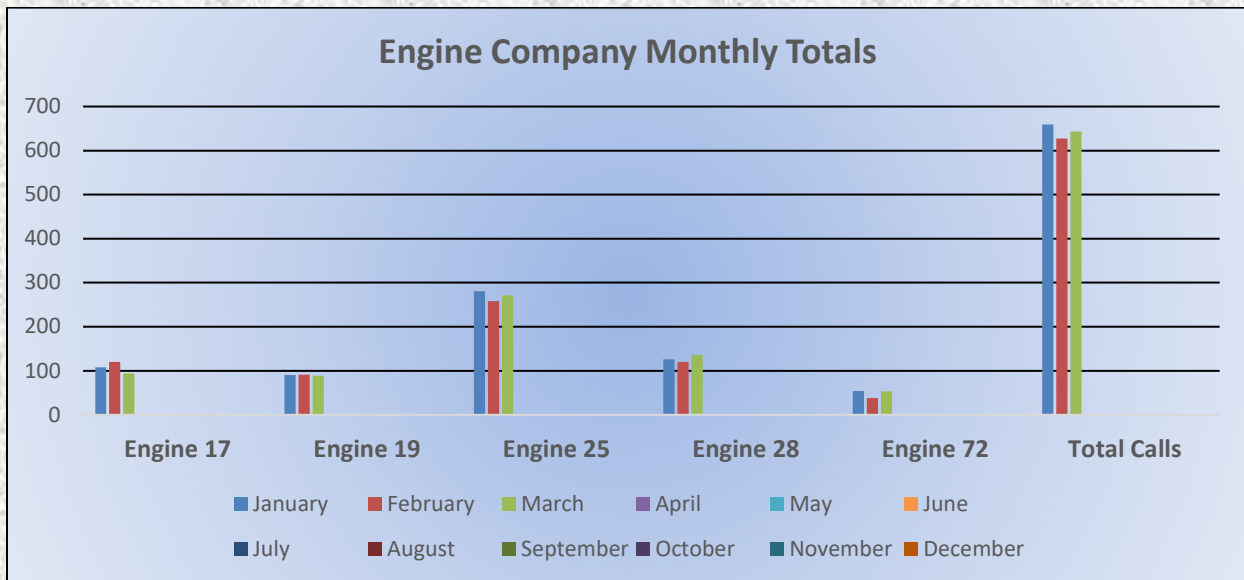

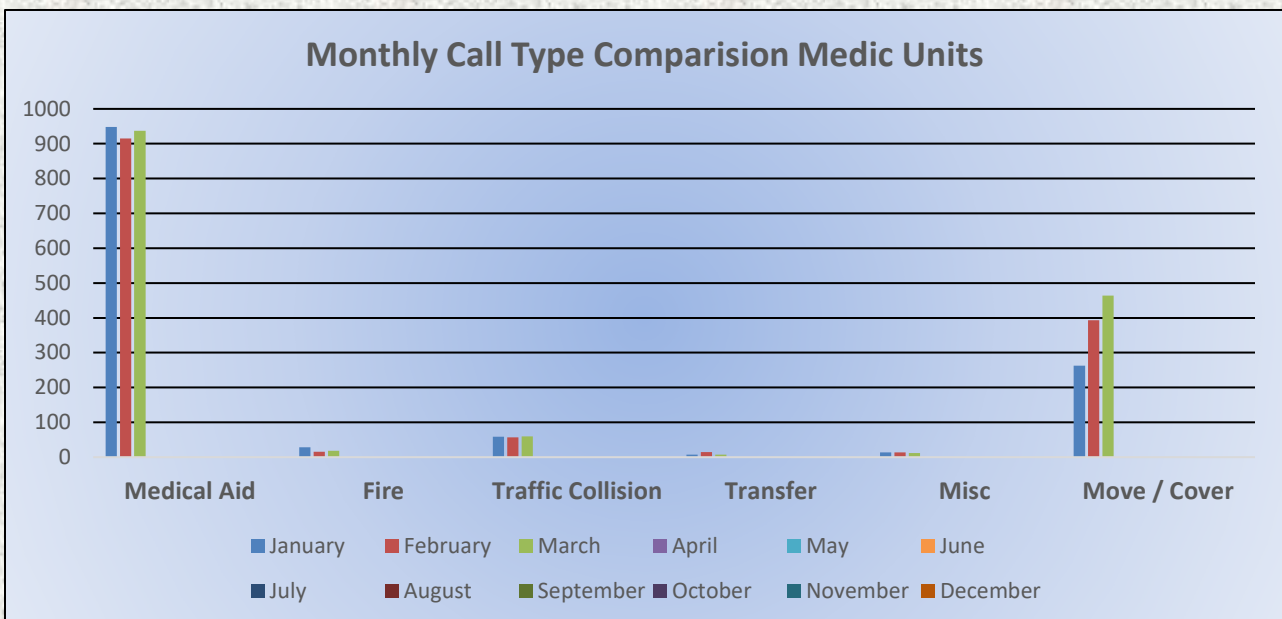
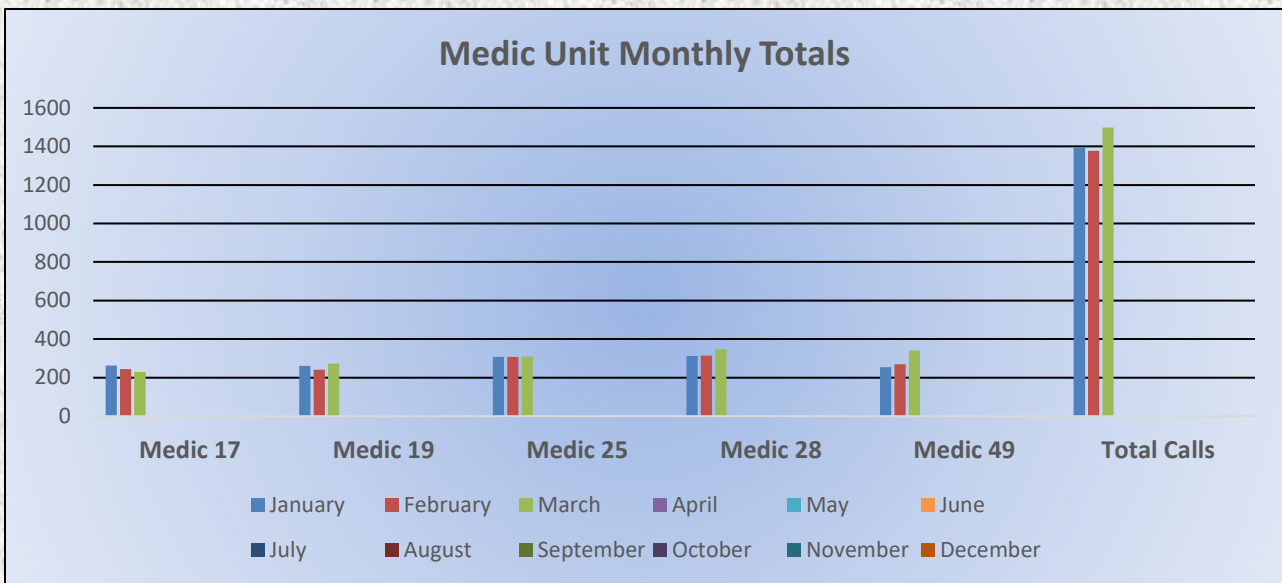

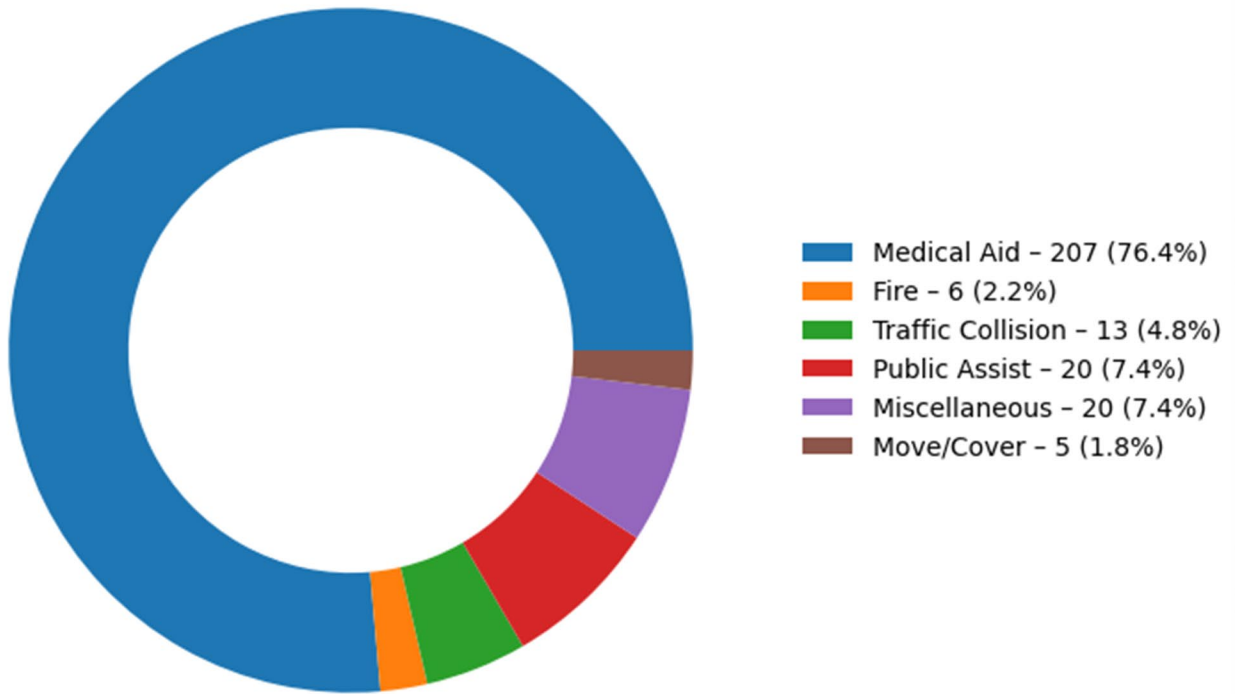


Engine 25 Call Volume Breakdown

Engine 25 Call Distribution (Total Calls: 271)

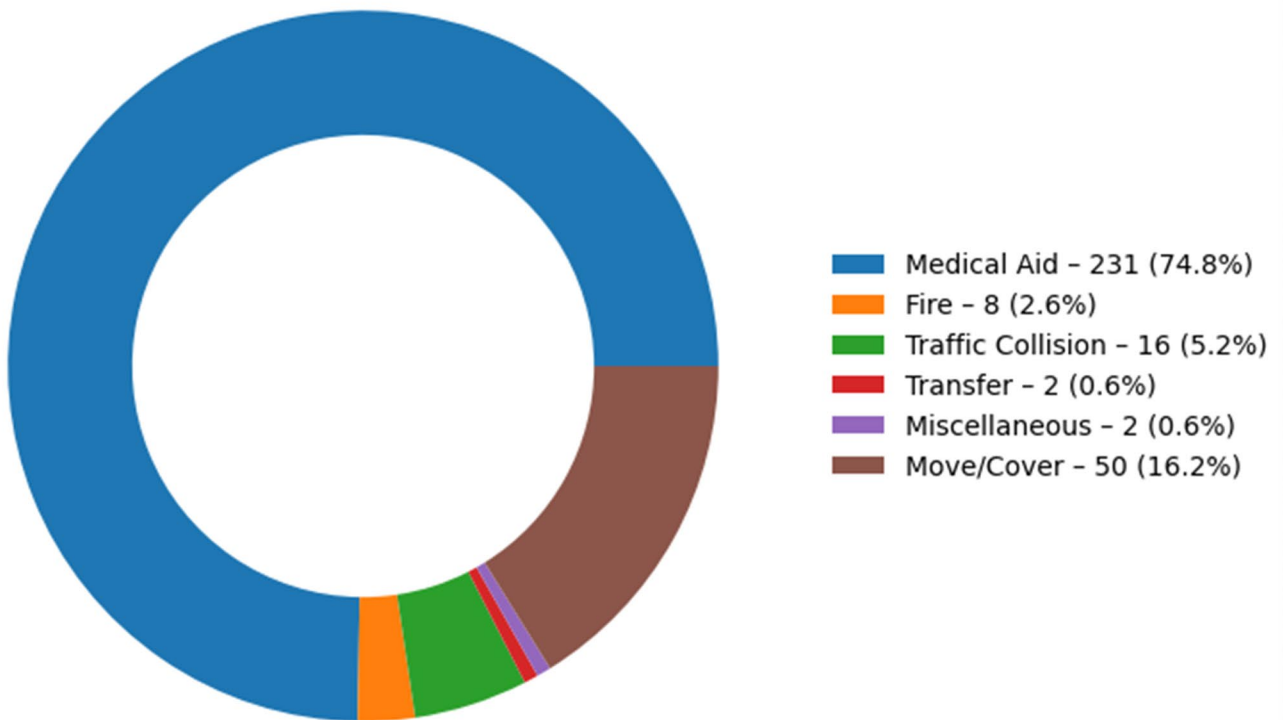




Medic 25 Call Volume Breakdown March 2026

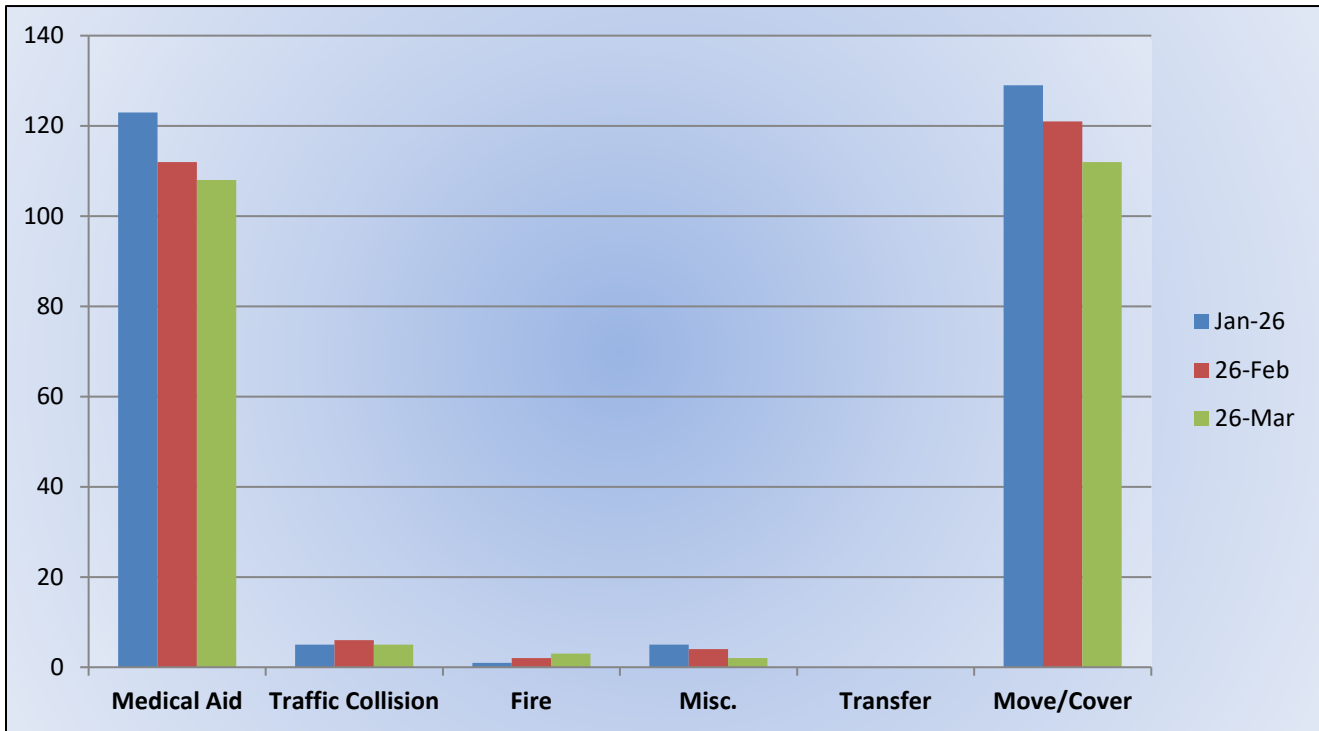


E17 Monthly Statistics Comparison
